Bestmen were Dale Burrows, brother of the bride, Ray and Robert King, brothers of the groom, and Harold Anderson,

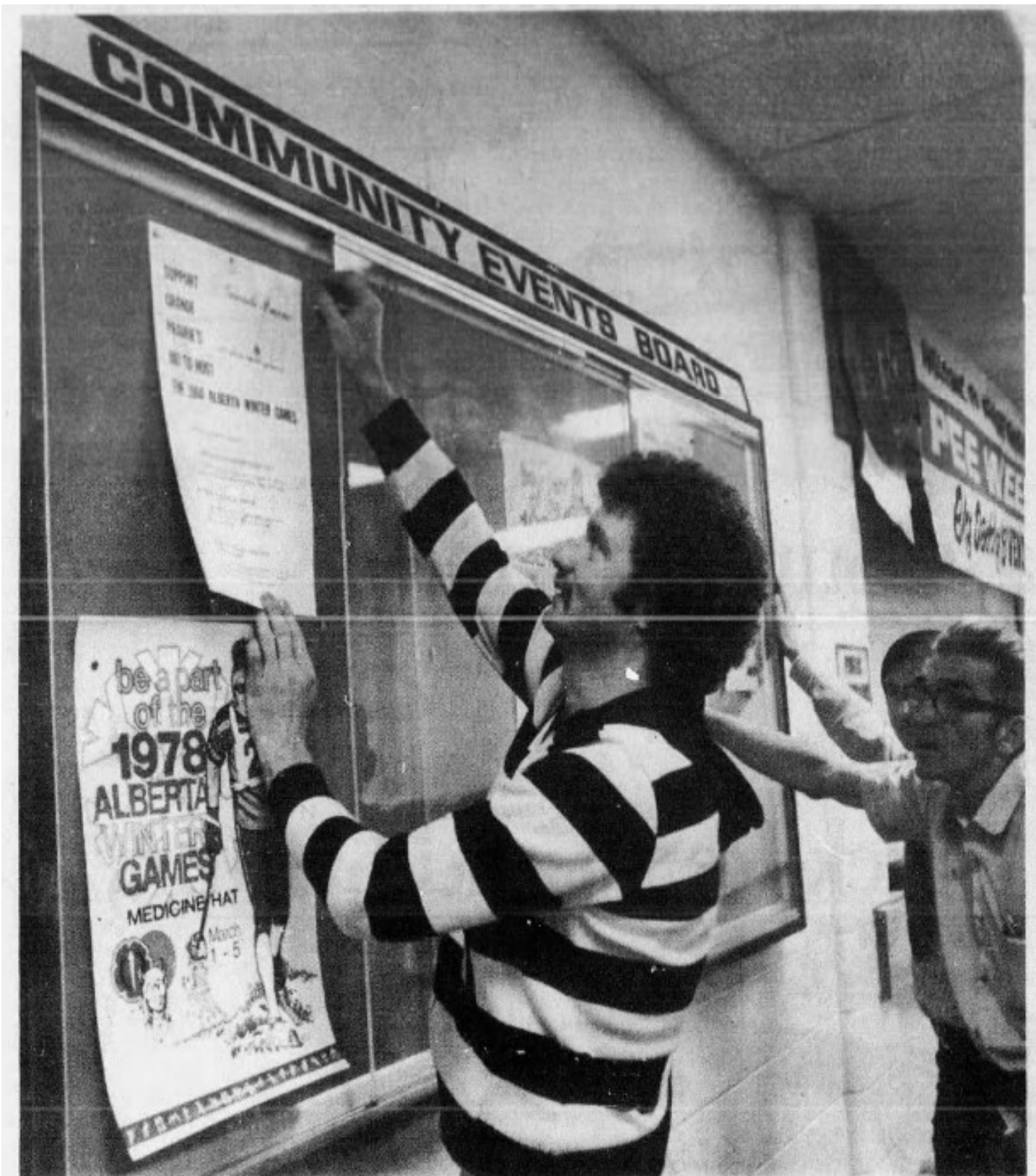
friend of the groom. Ushers were Bob Wurtz, and Albert King. Ring bearers were Mike Scott and Billy Ford.

Mileage milestone

Grande Prairie honors its safe-driving employees

Seven city employees reached an impressive milestone in 1985, maintaining eight years of accident-free driving.

They, and co-workers with similar but shorter records, were honored at the fourth annual City Safe Drivers Awards luncheon.

All spend a large part of their working days behind a wheel, operating heavy equipment like graders, driving city parks or public works service trucks, vans or cars (transit buses are not included).

The total number of accidents involving city vehicles dropped to 12 in 1985, from 14 the previous year. It follows a steady decline, from 23 in 1982 to 18 in 1983. The number of those deemed "preventable" in 1985 was the same, 8, as in 1984.

Safety and training supervisor, Chuck Simmons, said "I'm happy with that." But, he called for a concerted effort from all the employees: "Let's try for at least three fewer preventable accidents in 1986."

Introducing a short film on seat-belt use, Simmons advised his co-workers: "You all know my personal policy. I wear seat-belts all the time and those who ride with me do, too."

Irvin Carlson, Wallace Cook, Otto Jardie, Glen Larsen, Henry Mitchell, Bill Wood and Lloyd Volden were each applauded on reaching an eighth year of accident-free driving. Their names and those of all others who reach or pass the five-year mark are encribed on a plaque to be displayed at the City's Service Centre. Records have been kept since Jan. 1, 1978.

City hopes signs stop thrill sliders

Planted trees weren't enough. Instead of blocking the route, many were simply run over.

A large wooden barrier wasn't an effective deterrent either: diehard addicts still found room to launch their speedy snow rockets.

So, in what's hoped is a final effort to discourage thrill-seeking tobogganers from doing it, the city's community services department has had 'No Sliding' signs erected at the south end of Suicide Hill.

Acting community services director George Thomlison says the trees and barrier put in place this fall were not enough to stop a potentially dangerous practice — sliding down the hill's steep, scrubby west face.

Thomlison says the popular 102 St. and 89 Ave. sliding area is safe, except for all-too-frequent collisions at the bottom of the hill between those sliding down the hill's north side and those cruising the south end.

The hill's bowl-like shape make the flight-paths intersect — with injurious results.

HAVE TO BE ON TOES

"Anybody that's ever been to the sliding hill . . . knows the problem," Thomlison said. "You have to be on your toes when you come down that hill.

"People invariably meet at the bottom," he said. "There have been some serious accidents.

"Our intention is to discourage people from sliding on that part of the hill. I don't really like putting up signs to discourage people from doing things; I don't really like that non-positive attitude."

But yesterday, mounted high on metal poles, the signs went up at the top of the hill.

Two inform sliders there is 'No Sliding' on the south side; a third directs them to the approved sliding area.

Meanwhile, Thomlison directs tobogganers' attentions to the city's new sliding hill in the Centennial Park portion of Muskoseepi Park. It's located south of the spillway and has 'Borstad Point' at its top.

"You get a heck of a ride out of it because it's a long hill," Thomlison said.

Other benefits, he said, are that it's close to the park pavilion, with its warm-up area, hot chocolate, washrooms and large parking area.

Like Suicide Hill, it's lighted for night sliding.

FIRESIDE CAROLLING

Meanwhile, tonight, beginning at 7 p.m., there will be a fireside carolling get-together for the whole family at the pavilion. Come early, bring your skates, then stay on for hot chocolate around the fire. Admission is free.

Sunday at 2 p.m., the Centennial Park sliding hill and the skating pond at the pavilion will be officially opened for the season by Ald. Murray Jones and park mascot Muskee.

The first 100 visitors to the official opening will each be entitled to limited edition 'The Park Around the Corner' pins, supplied by the provincial government. Ask for the pins at the pavilion's front desk.

Food and hot chocolate will be available; public skating gets underway at 1 p.m.

City honors its drivers for accident-free records

The city's recent annual safe-driver awards luncheon was a mix of pride and chagrin for Chuck Simmons.

He's in charge of the city's employee safety programs. Although he had three drivers to congratulate on nine-year accident-free driving records, he also had to announce the news that "preventable" accidents with city vehicles had jumped.

The numbers had been declining for several years now, to just eight accidents deemed preventable in 1985. But for the city's 54 drivers in the various services, including transit and bylaw enforcement in 1986 that number rose to 14, plus six non-preventable.

"It's got to come down in 1987," Simmons said, asking for care and caution. Six preventable accidents involved backing into unseen obstacles. "If you see someone backing up, give them a hand in guiding the vehicle or warning of hazards."

While noting seven of those 14 accidents involved temporary or casual employees, Simmons added:

"I'm not making excuses, seven more didn't."

On a happier note, Simmons was able to join Mayor Dwight Logan in congratulating three veteran city drivers on nine-year unblemished records: Irvin Carlson, Otto Jardie and Henry Mitchell. Driving records only go back nine years.

Logan called it a "pleasure to participate in such a tremendous program. Everyone is a winner here — not only the city as employer, but the driver and the community, too."

Congratulated for eight-year on the job safe-driving records were Les Burrows, Wallace Cook, Jim Kruchten, Ray LaCroix, Merle Oliver, Norm Perra, Morris Toutant and Lloyd Volden.

Seven years with no accidents were: Josy Burrough, Gordon Jardie, Gordon Picken, Lyle Volden, Vern Volden and Harold Weberg.

With six-year records are: John Allen, Phil Briard, Peter Dziwenko and Jan Renwick.

Welcomed to the five-year club with a personalized scroll and pin, were city employees Roger Casavant, Larry Crerar, John McAllister, Calvin Volden, Lionel Volden and Harold Fiveland.

Safe-driving record gets better

From the perspective of safety, 1987 was a great year for the city.

"We had a total of only eight accidents involving city vehicles," said Chuck Simmons, the city's staff safety and training co-ordinator.

That was down from the previous year's 14. In fact, it's the lowest number in years.

Only three of those accidents were deemed "preventable," where it was judged a city driver was at fault, and all three of those drivers were temporary casual employees. As Simmons pointed out, no permanent driver had a preventable accident over those 12 months.

The people involved in the city's safe driving program range from bylaw officers and snowplow operators to the people who maintain the water supply and cut the grass around the city.

There were 54 of these staff members honored with a luncheon Jan. 20 and presentation of awards to those who had completed between one and 10 years of accident-free driving.

"Safety is an attitude" was the message presented in one of a couple of short videos presented at the luncheon.

"We have regular talks," said Simmons about how safe habits are reinforced with staff year-round. Once a year, the good-driving habits are acknowledged with individuals receiving pins or scrolls, and a plaque is mounted in the city's service centre for all to see the names recorded of safe drivers.

This year, three drivers reached the 10-year mark without an accident: Irvin Carlson of the water department and Otto Jardie and Henry Mitchell of public works. Their records may even extend further back, but it's only been a decade since the city began keeping them.

Carlson, Jardie and Mitchell each received a scroll, 10-year safe driver pin and a \$100 bonus.
