# City Chamber Honors 4 Outstanding Farmers

Farming success should never be measured in terms of financial gain, but should be measured in satisfaction.

With that statement, Charlie Moore of DeBolt, "husband and father" (as he put it) of a 1964 Master Farm Family, and president of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association, last night congratulated four South Peace farmers on their winning the Grande Prairie chamber of commerce's crop awards for 1964.

**Bruce McDonald** of Grande Prairie, Tony Semak of Clairmont, Doug Clarkson of Grande Prairie and Stan Lougheed of Grande Prairie were awarded engraved plaques by chamber president Fred Noble.

All raised the best standing crops in the area as judged by chamber agricultural committee chairman Harold Prochner and district agriculturist Neil Miller.

Mr. McDonald — copped his

award with Victory oats, Mr. Semak with Olli barley, Mr. Lougheed with flax and Mr. Clarkson with Thatcher wheat.

Runners-up were William Conrad of Clairmont (barley); Don McDonald of Grande Prairie (flax and oats), and Ed McIntosh of Dimsdale (wheat).

"All these winners have done something for the community," Mr. Moore said. "They have set an example and uplifted agriculture and agricultural people."

He said success on a farm to-

day depends mainly on a farmer's "ability to think, learn and cooperate."

He scored the attitude a farmer is a "smart but uneducated businessman" and said he "resented" the gap between farming and education.

"I resent the cheapening of education where its value is held in dollar and cents," Mr. Moore said.

Mr. Prochner chaired the evening. Mayor George Repka also spoke briefly.
